From the CSD

Welcome once again to the season of Christmas craziness! All around us the world is calling us to BUY!, RUSH!, GO!, and DO NOW! Yet the Advent season of the church, (for those not familiar with

the term, that is the four weeks leading up to Christmas), calls us as Christians to wait, watch and prepare for the coming of the Christ Child. What are we going to do this year in response to this set of opposing calls on our hearts and our time?

What have the world's ways brought us? Christmastime has become a stressful time of year for many people. According to the National Institutes of Health, Christmas is a time of year when people report a higher incidence of depression and anxiety. The underlying causes of this uptick in sadness include less sunlight, unrealistic expectations, financial pressure, and excessive commercialization. The report also said many people felt increased pressure to be perfect during the holiday season. To me, this is not something I want to celebrate or embody.

So let's look at some Scriptural guidance here: In what is considered a classic Gospel story for this time of year, we see John the Baptist in his camel hair clothes calling to all people to, "Repent! For the kingdom of heaven has come near!" Although the four Gospels differ in many ways in how they portray the Christmas story, all four contain this call of John the Baptist on God's people.

We don't use the word repent much nowadays outside of the church. Most people think it means to be sorry. But that's not really it. In the Greek, the word literally means to change one's mind.

Biblical scholars describe it more broadly as reorienting, reordering, or re-centering. I think a good way to look at repentance is like being reset. For those who love to cook, even when it's not the holiday season, one of the most important pieces of equipment in the modern kitchen is a digital scale. It can accurately weigh ingredients to a tenth of an ounce, allowing one to prepare delicate cakes or other delicious treats. But every now and then, something goes wrong: for some reason the scale stops measuring things accurately, and the values are way off. When that happens, we have to zero it out; we have to reset it. Then it functions once again as it should.

The writer Anne Lamott once said that most things can be fixed if we just turn them off for a while and back on, including ourselves (we of the digital age with computers and smart phones can certainly identify with that concept!). Maybe we are all like that kitchen scale: When our values get off and things seem to no longer add up correctly, we too need to be reset...reordered, reoriented. That is the essence of John the Baptist's message: We need to reorder our lives, reset our priorities, and return to our God...for the kingdom of heaven is here...and we don't want to miss it!

This message is good news for those who are struggling at this time of year. It is good news for anyone who has tried to meet the expectations and requirements of the season or of society, and fallen short. So many people back then and here and now--are caught in that old equation, playing the game of "if you do this, then that will occur"...and losing. We know that if we use the "if-then" equation to judge ourselves, we will never be good enough or kind enough or faithful enough.

In a world where it so often feels like the rules are rigged against us, John's message brings hope. A new day has dawned, and it brings a light that shines on all people. "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near."

This is the medicine that can heal our holiday blues better than any batch of cookies or yet another party; this is the peace of God, the one that surpasses all our understanding, the one that can quiet all our anxieties. Rest, repent, reset, rejoice...this is the best way to prepare ourselves to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, Emmanuel...God with us.
